## Your Share in Sports' Greatest Record

**T**hose who play and those who watch during this amateur championship of the Western Golf Association are partners in an immensely helpful and unique manifestation of high sportsmanship.

The Evans Scholars Foundation of the Western Golf Association which benefits from the net proceeds of this championship has no parallel service in any other sport. The sportsman in traditional principle is a genial, generous guy but only the golfer expresses his friendliness and generosity in a way that finances higher scholastic education for the bag-toting young acolytes of the game.

Now there are 127 Evans Scholars in universities. There have been 254 young men who have received their collegiate education with the financial assistance of the Western's Evans Scholars plan. Without this help very few of the lads would have been able to get the scholastic training which, judged by their post graduate records in business and professional work, has been immeasurably valuable to them, their communities and this nation.

Each golfer who shares in this Evans Scholarship financing is richly rewarded by the remarkably high standard of achievement of the lads, and can thank Chick for founding this fund.

In 1920 after Chick had won his second National Amateur title and the fifth of his eight Western Amateur championships he was asked to make golf instruction phonograph records. Rather than relinquish his amateur standing by accepting money for the records, Chick got the USGA, after peculiarly long deliberation, to approve his proposal to turn the royalties over to the Western Golf Association for caddie scholarships.

From the start of \$12,000 and with the astute, conscientious and vigorous management and promotion by Western Golf Association officials, and Chick's constant service, the fund has grown to its present extensive area of assistance — and still is short of requirements.

Following the Evans Scholarship inspiration and plan there have been other caddie scholarship funds established by district golf associations in Michigan, Minnesota, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Western Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Ohio, Illinois, Missouri and the Pacific Northwest and by the National Caddie Association in cooperation with the Professional Golfers' Association. There is a caddie scholarships fund being established in New York, bearing Gene Sarazen's name. Another fund for financing caddie scholarships in Negro universities is being established in the south.

In addition to Sarazen, other friends of Chick's who are honored by scholarships to youngsters who, like Chick, came into golf through the caddie yard, are Jim Standish, Francis Ouimet, Ned Allis, the late Maynard G. Fessenden (former president of the WGA), and the late Alex Rose, pioneer golf reporter of the Pacific Northwest.

The illustrious Chick now is scoring anywhere between 71 and 85, but in scoring for the caddies Chick with his inspired scholarship idea and the pattern of its development and use which the Western Golf Association has set, is making by far the greatest record in the annals of sports.

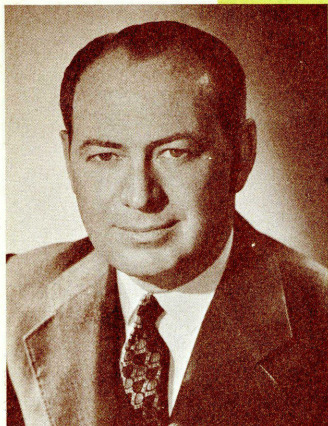

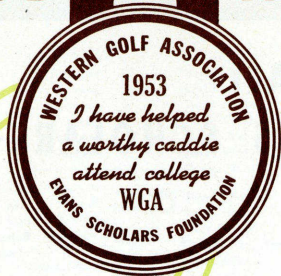

# THE CLUB AND WGA



KEYNOTE to the success of the Evans Scholars program has been the tremendous support of WGA clubs and their memberships. Symbolizing such support is the WGA bag tag, which is attached to the golf bags of each contributor.

In 1952, a record 15,573 golfers contributed to the Evans Scholars program with tax-deductible donations of \$5 or more. Through such support, a program involving more than 200 caddie-scholars annually is approaching a reality.

More than 50 WGA member clubs, recognizing the enhancement of their programs through improved caddie service, conduct their own solicitations for the Fund by placing an optional charge on each member's house account. This type of support is particularly evident among the more than 80 clubs which have sponsored their caddies as Evans Scholars.



**PAR CLUB  
OF WGA**

Organized in 1950, the Par Club has become a substantial source of support for the expanding Evans Scholars program. Its membership is made up of those who have contributed \$100 or more to the education of deserving caddies, and in 1952 included 187 members.

## WGA AFFILIATES

Through the supervision and guidance of WGA, five progressive state and district golf associations are sponsoring funds to furnish college educations to their own caddies. These associations are:

**WISCONSIN STATE GOLF ASSOCIATION**—Honoring one of Wisconsin's leading golfers and citizens, the Edward P. "Ned" Allis Scholarship Fund was started in 1947 and has already aided 16 Wisconsin caddie-scholars.

**DETROIT DISTRICT GOLF ASSOCIATION**—The James D. Standish, Jr., Fund, named after the immediate past president of the USGA, since 1948 has awarded 21 caddie-scholarships and last fall established a chapter house at the University of Michigan.

**PACIFIC NORTHWEST GOLF ASSOCIATION**—Named in memory of a pioneer Seattle golf writer, the Alex Rose Memorial Fund has awarded five scholarships at the University of Washington since its inception in 1948.

**ILLINOIS WOMEN'S GOLF ASSOCIATION**—The IWGA Scholarship Fund has aided six caddie-scholars since 1949, and has concentrated its program at the University of Illinois.

**MINNESOTA STATE GOLF ASSOCIATION**—A WGA affiliate since 1950, the Minnesota State Golf Association has awarded three scholarships to the outstanding caddies of the Minneapolis-St. Paul area.

In the moments of his greatest triumph — as winner of both the National Open and Amateur Championships in the year 1916 — Charles "Chick" Evans, Jr., and his mother saw the vision of his greatest and most indelible contribution to the great game of golf.

They conceived the caddie-scholarship program which, under the sponsorship of Western Golf Association, grew from a meager beginning in 1930 to what has been acclaimed the "most valuable, unselfish work being done in sports." Today the famous Evans Scholars Foundation, named in honor of its founder, furnishes college educations to 127 deserving caddies and throughout its history has aided more than 250 qualified young men.

"Chick" Evans long has been the caddies' best friend. More than anyone else, he has aided the caddie and his reward has been the splendid records of the Evans Scholars who have stepped confidently into almost every walk of life . . . doctors, lawyers, engineers, soldiers, fine citizens.

Evans Scholars today are enrolled in 26 colleges and universities from coast to coast. More than 80 country clubs have contributed one or more of their caddies to the program. Chapter houses of caddie-scholars have been established at Northwestern University and the Universities of Illinois and Michigan.

Evans Scholarships include full tuition and room rent for four years. The costs of meals, clothing and incidentals are met by waiting on tables or at other part-time work.

The Evans Scholar is one of the truly "American Products," thanks to the foresight and benevolence of Charles "Chick" Evans and the support of the many golfers and citizens whose generosity has made such scholarships possible.

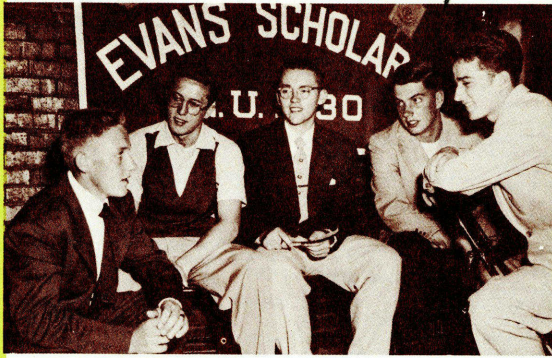


# THE SCHOLARS AND WGA

With the Evans Scholars banner in the background, hopeful candidates gather on the porch of Evans House to await their interviews.



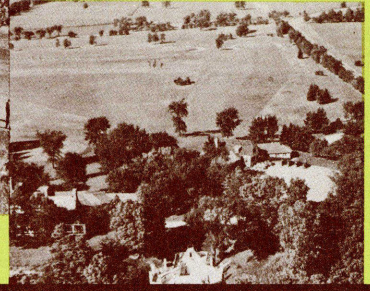

## How Blythefield Happened

There would be no beautiful Blythefield Country Club today, had Mr. Joseph H. Brewer not lived. He was one of Grand Rapids first citizens in the 1920's and 1930's, a man of unlimited vision and foresight, who has left many monuments to this community.

Joe Brewer lived on his farm across the road from the present Blythefield Country Club property when it was owned and first established by an Automobile Club. He purchased the property from that Club in 1927, and immediately started to convert it into a golf course. He remodeled the existing building into a fine, modern Club house, built a new Athletic Lodge, and constructed one of the best outdoor swimming pools in this part of the country.

Mr. Brewer also purchased all of the surrounding farms which could be seen from the Club location, until he owned in excess of fifteen hundred acres. The original Club property consisted of approximately two hundred acres.

The course was laid out by Langford & Moreau, and constructed by Eugene Goebel, one of the most noted landscape artists this city has ever known.

On June 14, 1929 Blythefield Club was dedicated by a match between Walter Hagan and Horton Smith opposing Nick Webber, the Club professional and Maurie Wells, then Cascade Country Club pro.

Mr. Brewer invited a list of distinguished local and national guests to take part in the dedication. Following this, about one hundred and fifty leading business and professional men of Grand Rapids and vicinity were invited to membership in Blythefield Country Club. From then on, until World War II, various of the members each year made financial contributions, which were added to Mr. Brewer's.

In 1940 Mr. Brewer died.

A twenty mile drive (the Club is ten miles from Grand Rapids) during gasoline rationing, plus the fact that everyone was working round the clock to win the war, resulted in a terrific shrinkage in Club membership. In 1942 there were less than fifty names on the membership list.

About this time it was discovered that at a previous date a bond issue amounting to \$150,000 had been floated on the property. The Detroit Liquidation Corporation held these bonds. The Corporation wanted its money, and proposed that one hundred and fifty individuals in Grand Rapids each buy a thousand dollar bond. Their efforts to work out such a deal met with failure.

The Corporation then suggested that Blythefield Country Club be merged with Kent Country Club. This plan was also defeated.

At this stage the Detroit group had decided to take the property. Mr. Leon Harrington and Mr. Harold T. Fletcher were appointed a committee to negotiate some arrangement which might be feasible, to save the Club. This was at a time when all Country Clubs were experiencing difficulty and unhappy times financially.

After several months of hard work, meetings between various groups and individuals, and continued negotiation between all involved, an offer was made to the Detroit Liquidation Corporation. It was proposed that land, buildings, furniture and furnishings, original paintings, silver, dishes, and all equipment, be purchased by the Club members for a little less than \$50,000.

This seems today like a wonderful proposition, but at that time the committee of two had a terrific struggle getting fifty individuals to part with one thousand dollars each. Finally it was accomplished.

A bond issue was then placed on the property for something more than the \$50,000 in order to do the necessary things to put the Club back into shape.

\*Very few Country Clubs are money makers, but Blythefield Club has been steadily progressing since those dark days, improving physically and financially each year. Its present situation is such that it is privileged to act as host Club to the Western Amateur Golf Tournament, at this time.

To those who have had a part over the years in the founding and development of beautiful Blythefield Country Club, this occasion will seem like a rededication of the aims and ideals which Joseph H. Brewer envisioned nearly a quarter century ago.

\*At this time Mr. R. E. Jervis became president and through his untiring efforts the Club membership rose in two years to over two hundred, and today the membership is over 280.

KEYNOTE to the progress and integrity of Western Golf Association has been the officers, directors and trustees who have given extensively of their time toward the advancement of golf and the caddie-scholar program. In no instance has a member of the WGA Board received any remuneration or reimbursement for expenses incurred in connection with these activities. Serving as the 34th president of Western Golf Association is Stanley J. McGiveran, a leading Toledo industrialist and long a prominent figure in national sports.

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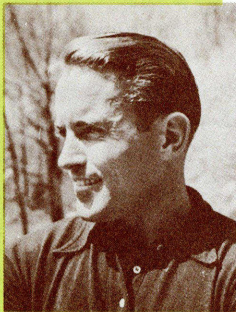

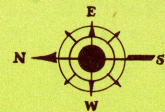

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE SPECTATORS

1. If you know one of the players, do **NOT** speak to him until he has holed out on the hole he is playing.
2. **WALK;** never run.
3. Stay behind ropes.
4. Heed the requests of the Marshals. They know what is best for **YOU** and the player.
5. If you happen to be standing behind the player, **STAND PERFECTLY STILL.**
6. Walk **AROUND TRAPS AND BUNKERS,** never through them.
7. In a golf contest, **SILENCE IS GOLDEN.** Never call "Down in front!" **NEVER SHOUT.**
8. Stay off the **PUTTING GREENS** at all times.
9. Keep well off fairways. Never decide the other side is better and run across. Keep your head up; eyes open. Don't wonder aimlessly. If you hear the call "Fore," that means a ball may be coming your way. Turn your back to the direction the call came from and shield your face.
10. During the tournament, you **MUST NOT** take a camera on the course. Get your pictures on the practice tee. Check your camera in the booth.

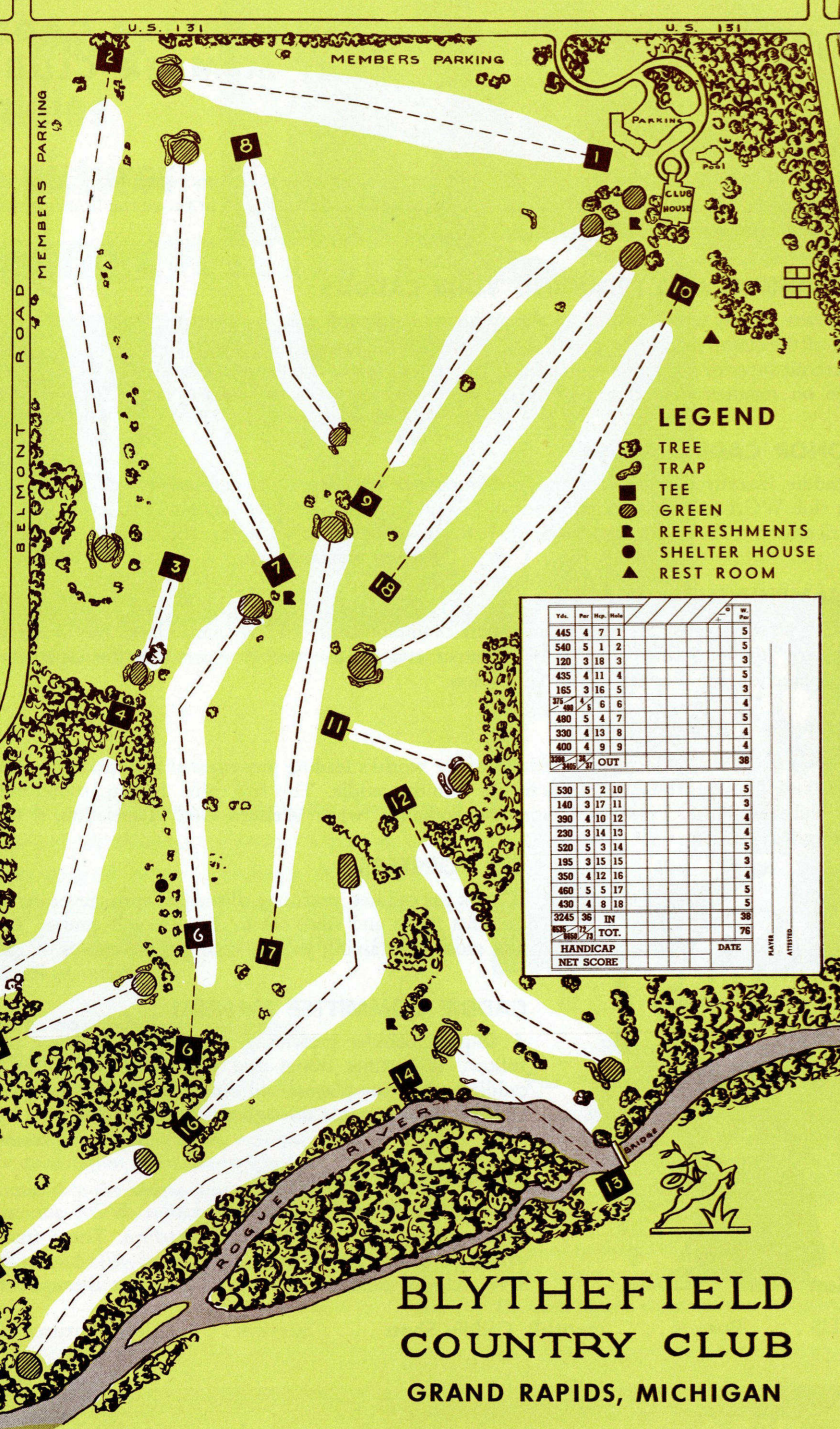

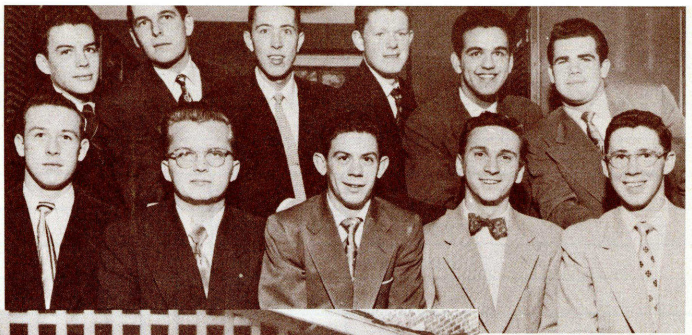

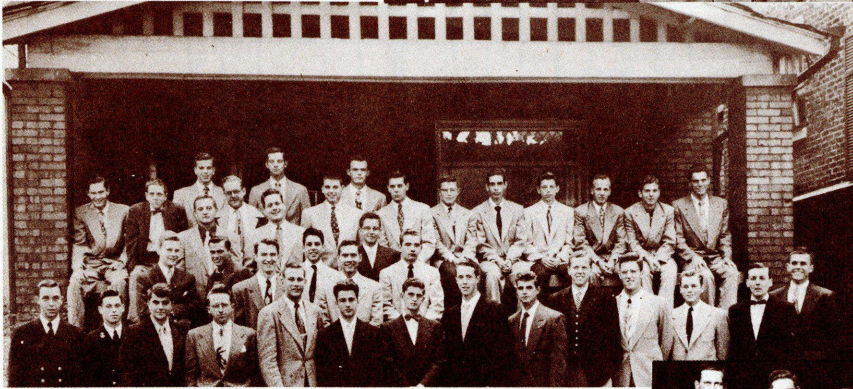
